TWENTY-SECOND SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME - 1 September 2024

Dear sisters and brothers,

Keeping things in perspective is always a challenge, particularly when we are very enthusiastic about something. I'm thinking of something even so ordinary as a "one eyed" football supporter for whom the umpire is always wrong when a decision goes against their team; for whom the opposition players are always "staging" for free kicks or being unfairly rough on their team's players or for whom anything good the opposition does is just a "fluke".

I realize I'm on dangerous ground wading into football commentary, so I won't dwell further on it except to say it gives a crude sort of introduction into what I think Jesus is getting at in today's Gospel story from St Mark when he talks about the Pharisees and Scribes, who were very enthusiastic on observing the Law of Moses - fundamentally a good thing. As a good Jew, Jesus himself would have recognized the Law of Moses and observed it in its fundamentals. Jesus would have been very familiar with and applauded today's 1st Reading from the Book of Deuteronomy which presents Moses exhorting the people to take notice of the laws and customs that I teach you today, and observe them, that you may have life.

The problem with many of the Pharisees and Scribes, however, which Jesus draws attention to in the Gospel, is that, in their enthusiasm to do what Moses exhorted, they got carried away and tried to improve on the basics Moses gave them by imposing on the people all sorts of pedantic rituals of washings after contact with non-Jews in the market and other public places.

Jesus is not really trying to defend what seem like the unhygienic practices of some of his disciples. Rather, he is pointing out to these Pharisees and Scribes that these pedantic rituals and other customs that they are obsessed with (and which are not imposed for hygienic purposes) are not only non-essentials in honouring God, but given their obsession with them, they represent a loss of perspective about what is really important. These Pharisees and Scribes have become obsessed with what are only human regulations. In doing so, they are hindering their own right relationship with God and his people and also preventing others from being drawn into right Continued on page 4

relationship with God and neighbour. Jesus is telling them that they are not made "unclean" by their contact with non-Jews (what goes into a person from outside) but by what comes out of them ... from within them, from their hearts ... like fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, malice, deceit, indecency, envy, slander, pride, folly.

In today's 2nd Reading, St James is reinforcing for his early Christian community the point that Jesus has made in the Gospel when he tells them *Pure*, *unspoilt religion*, in the eyes of God our Father is this: coming to the help of orphans and widows when they need it, and keeping oneself uncontaminated by the world.

Today's Readings all serve as a reminder and encouragement to us to keep things in perspective; to focus on the fundamentals – what comes from within our hearts; namely, our personal relationship with God, fostered by prayer and a spirit of love and thanksgiving that leads us to express what is in our hearts by loving one another in practical ways ... as God has loved us.

AUSTRALIAN CATHOLIC BISHOPS CONFERENCE 2024 SOCIAL JUSTICE STATEMENT

This year's Social Justice Statement, *Truth and Peace: A Gospel in a Violent World* (https://socialjustice.catholic.org.au/2024/07/25/social-justice-statement-2024-25/), outlines a number of the dynamics that contribute to the current erosion of truth: competing truth claims, loss of authority and trust, the growth of social media, computing power and AI and the corporations who control them, bias, and a culture of individualism and self-promotion. In his speech for the statement's launch, Associate Professor Joel Hodge suggests that seeing our lives as a gift, rather than our own individual project, might help us find a path through this minefield towards peace and truth.

TEMPORARY ACCOMMODATION

A 20 year-old man is seeking temporary accommodation in the area. He is from Ireland, where he completed his secondary education.

He has been living in Port Melbourne for the past 21 months and participating in an American football kicking program called Prokick Australia since arriving here. This program is aimed at helping young people get placed into College in the United States on a full athletic scholarship as kickers/punters (people who kick the ball).

As his current visa and house lease expire in early September, he will be renewing his visa but needs to find alternative temporary accommodation until he is able to move in with a family in another area of Melbourne sometime in October before leaving for the US in January on a scholarship to a US College. He is a very family oriented young man and is looking for somewhere to stay, with company, for a few weeks in September. Despite searching for this over the past few week/months he has not found anything suitable and has turned to me for assistance.

He describes himself as "easy going, clean and willing to help out around the house if needs be". He is also happy to pay rent for the short amount of time for which he is looking for accommodation. I have found him to be polite, friendly, chatty and I believe honest and trustworthy. His name is Donal Dempsey. REFLECTION

Washing Hearts, Not Hands

This weekend we resume reading from St Mark's Gospel. This Sunday's episode is about ritual purity verses purity of heart. The Pharisees were a group of especially observant Jews. They took ritual observance very seriously. These observant Pharisees and some scribes criticise the disciples for 'not following the tradition of the elders' by not washing their hands before eating.

This passage is not about good hygiene but about a ritual practice. By the time of Jesus the Pharisees wanted to extend the laws of ritual purity, which applied only to priests, to all the people. Jesus accuses them of substituting the law of God with mere human regulations.

The second point that Jesus makes is that it is not what goes into a person from outside which makes them unclean, but what they harbour in their hearts and minds.

We, too, can fall into the trap of thinking that our ritual practices (going to Mass, saying the Rosary, etc) are all that is necessary to be good followers of Jesus.

Some Christians seem to think that ritual practice is about being at rights with God; almost like 'paying God off'. That having been done, they are free to do what they like in their actions towards other human beings.

The teaching of Jesus in the Gospel today challenges both those views.

It is the reform of our hearts, not our ritual practices, which needs attention and is most important in living out the vocation God has given us. If the goodness of God is not seen through us, where can it be seen?

Jesus reminds his listeners that evil does not come from the outside, but from within. According to Jesus, being at rights with God is not achieved through ritual practice but through inner conversion to the mind and heart of God.

Real religion, according to the Jesus tradition, is not about ritual practise but about how we treat each other

It's our hearts, not our hands, which need washing.



The Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered round Jesus, and they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with unclean hands, that is, without washing them. For the Pharisees, and the Jews in general, follow the tradition of the elders and never eat without washing their arms as far as the elbow; and on returning from the market place they never eat without first sprinkling themselves. There are also many other observances which have been handed down to them concerning the washing of cups and pots and bronze dishes. So these Pharisees and scribes asked him, 'Why do your disciples not respect the tradition of the elders but eat their food with unclean hands?' He answered, 'It was of you hypocrites that Isaiah so rightly prophesied in this passage of scripture:

This people honours me only with lip-service, while their hearts are far from me.

The worship they offer me is worthless, the doctrines they teach are only human regulations.

You put aside the commandment of God to cling to human traditions.'

He called the people to him again and said, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand. Nothing that goes into a man from outside can make him unclean; it is the things that come out of a man that make him unclean. For it is from within, from men's hearts, that evil intentions emerge: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, malice, deceit, indecency, envy, slander, pride, folly. All these evil things come from within and make a man unclean.'

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried; he descended into hell; on the third day he rose again from the dead; he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty; from there he will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting. Amen.


BASP - JUSTICE FOR ASYLUM SEEKERS &
