## **RECEPTION OF THE SACRAMENTS**

This weekend we welcome all our candidates for the Sacraments of Reconciliation, Eucharist and Confirmation. Each of them is attaining an important milestone in their lives in terms of their Christian faith and so I would ask you to pray for them. Pray that the Sacrament they receive brings them closer to the God who loves them.

## **REFLECTION**

This Sunday is "Gaudete" Sunday and the word itself means "Rejoice". It is also the Sunday where we light the pink candle as a sign of joy and celebration. Even the priests are encouraged to wear rose coloured vestments and although our supply of them is adequate, they feel a little ridiculous. I've never looked good in pink!

More importantly, the readings this weekend speak of joy and exultation especially in the reading from the prophet Zephaniah and Paul's letter to the Philippians. The Gospel tells us more of the story of John the Baptist. Despite his very dire predictions and sound advice he speaks of a Saviour who is coming after him and it is that Saviour whom we celebrate at Christmas.

I read a story the other day told by Anthony de Mello:

There was once a very wise man who became something of a legend and a Master and "it was said that God once sought his advice: 'I want to play a game of hide-and-seek with humankind. I've asked my Angels what the best place is to hide in. Some say the depth of the ocean. Others say the top of the highest mountain. Others still the far side of the moon or a distant star. What do you suggest? And the Master replied, 'Hide in the human heart. That's the last place they will think of!'"

## IN OUR PARISH

I like the story because it is true on so many levels. We often search for God and we find traces of the divine in the magnificence of creation, in the goodness of others, in the moments when we are most alone, and sometimes when we are bowed down in the midst of grief. But the truest place to find God is within, in the heart that beats inside each of us.

Now sometimes our hearts beat because they are healthy; at other times, we need a mechanical device to keep it going or perhaps a new artery or three. We often take blood pressure tablets to stave off a stroke or a heart attack. But the heart is the centre of our life and when it stops beating we normally die. Sobering isn't it?

The important point is that it is within that God can speak so strongly to us. The trouble is we are so distracted by many things: living, caring, having fun, eating, sleeping, walking and they can all distract us from the God who is within. It takes practice to sit with one's own heart and to realise that it beats because it has the breathe of God within it.

Next time you start to worry about your heart, remember that the Lord is what sustains it, with a little help from modern medicine, and take the time to cherish the gift within and know that it is God's gift to us.

## REFLECTION ON THIS WEEK'S READINGS

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During Advent, Daniel went to his mother demanding a new bicycle for Christmas.

'Danny, we can't afford it', she said, 'so write a letter to Jesus and pray for one instead.'

'Dear Jesus, I've been a good boy this year and would appreciate a new bicycle. Your friend, Daniel.'

Now Danny guessed that Jesus really knew he was a brat so he tore it up and tried again.

'Dear Jesus, I've been an OK boy this year and I want a new bicycle. Yours truly, Daniel.'

Danny knew this wasn't true so he tore it up and tried again.

'Dear Jesus, I've thought about being a good boy so may I have a new bicycle? Daniel.'

Finally, Danny thought better of making these false claims and so ran to the Church. He went inside and stole a small statue of Mary and ran out the door. He went home, hid it under his bed and wrote this letter.

'Jesus, let's face it, I've broken most of the Commandments; tore up my sister's doll and lots more. I'm desperate. I've got your mother Mary, if you ever want to see her again, give me a bike for Christmas. You know who.'

There is something of Danny in all of us.

We often think that we can bargain with God to get the best possible deal out of life. The problem with this bargaining image is that it is based on faith that does not believe in Advent. The bargaining image of God is the furthest thing from the mind of the writers of today's readings – Zephaniah, the Canticle from Isaiah, Philippians and Luke. Each of them rejoices in the undeserved gift God gives to the world. We do not deserve God's love given to us in the Babe of Bethlehem. It is God's overflowing goodness which pours out in Jesus and through him and the Spirit we have been welcomed into the family of God and bear his name.

These Scriptures remind us that God has not held back one thing in his love for us. By becoming one with us in our flesh, God has done everything he can to assure us of his saving love. He has shown us all what can be shown about how to live lives of sacrifice, justice and love to transform our world.

In today's Gospel John's disciples are full of wanting to know what they can do to earn God's love. The crowds, tax collectors and soldiers ask what they can do to gain God's favour. While there is much to do, Advent reminds us every year that all we do is a response to the initial, undeserved goodness of God.

Still the image of us 'doing a deal' with God is so prevalent in our theology and prayer. 'I will be a better person if I get well.' 'I will return to Sunday Mass if I pass my exams.'

All dreadful stuff. And the Church has to take some responsibility for this and correct it.

Advent teaches us that we have to witness to a God who risked everything so that we might know love and life in this world and in the next. We hold and proclaim, in season and out of season, a God who emptied himself of power and might and came to us as a baby.

That's not the profile of a deal-doer. It's the portrait of a lover.

So this Advent let's not ransom ourselves to a benevolent dictator. Let's ask for anything we need with confidence that God has heard our words and so sent love itself in Jesus Christ.


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## LITURGICAL ART

### *Art and Reflection by Jenny Close*

***In the natural world water usually quenches fire, but in Luke's gospel the two elements are reconciled in the experience of baptism. Both the material and the spiritual aspects of baptism are evoked when John baptises with water and Jesus will baptise with fire and the Holy Spirit. In the same passage, Luke describes Jesus' fire as unquenchable. It is in the context of this rich terrestrial/celestial imagery that the advent of Jesus is prophesied.***

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## LIGHTING OF THE SECOND ADVENT CANDLE

- Celebrant: Lord Jesus Christ  
you are already in our midst,  
yet we long for you to come more fully  
and more deeply into our hearts.
- Celebrant: Give us patience and hope  
**All: *as we prepare for your coming.***
- Celebrant: In the desert of our fear and anxiety  
**All: *your light is calm and strong.***
- Celebrant: In the wilderness of violence and despair  
**All: *your light is peace and hope.***
- Celebrant: In the desert of narrow, darkened alleys  
**All: *your light lets us see to build anew.***
- Celebrant: In the wilderness of our hearts  
**All: *you light up our way as we prepare for you.***
- Celebrant: May this candle remind us of your presence  
which enlightens our minds  
and warms our hearts and shows us the way  
as we gather in the circle of its light.

### *Zephaniah 3:14-18*

## GOSPEL

### *Luke 3:10-18*

When all the people asked John, 'What must we do?' he answered, 'If anyone has two tunics he must share with the man who has none, and the one with something to eat must do the same.' There were tax collectors too who came for baptism, and these said to him, 'Master, what must we do?' He said to them, 'Exact no more than your rate.' Some soldiers asked him in their turn, 'What about us? What must we do?' He said to them, 'No intimidation! No extortion! Be content with your pay!'

A feeling of expectancy had grown among the people, who were beginning to think that John might be the Christ, so John declared before them all, 'I baptise you with water, but someone is coming, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to undo the strap of his sandals; he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing-fan is in his hand to clear his threshing-floor and to gather the wheat into his barn; but the chaff he will burn in a fire that will never go out.' As well as this, there were many other things he said to exhort the people and to announce the Good News to them.
