Dear sisters and brothers.

This weekend I would like to share with you some information about the *Synod on Synodality* which Pope Francis has convened and which is currently happening in Rome. This information is drawn, with permission, from a report in *Catholic Outlook*, an online publication of the Diocese of Parramatta NSW. It is titled <u>Ear to the Ground: Letter Two from a listening and global Synod</u> By Br Mark O'Connor FMS. Br Mark writes:

Dear Friends,

In the chaos of contemporary life and even inside the Church, we are all tempted to lose hope. But these days, in Rome, the Spirit of the Risen Jesus is hovering over the 'chaos'. The Spirit is breaking through and breathing new life into the Universal Church, through this global Synod – which aims to renew our Church...

Emerging signs of hope

Pope Francis has decided to ask the Synod participants to listen to each respectfully and to honour the confidentiality of the small group process that has begun. He wants to avoid polarisation and division and stresses the spiritual nature of the event. It is not a 'parliament', but a new way of being Church attentive to how the Spirit is speaking powerfully – even in silence . . .

Putting my 'ear to the ground', I could observe some very clear signs of hope ...

- 1. The **retreat** before the Synod. It was extraordinary and clearly deeply moved many delegates. Timothy Radcliffe OP set the tone for an exciting first week to follow.
- 2. The importance given to the **process of listening and conversion**.

The entrance to the Synod hall: with its San Damiano Cross reminded us that spiritual renewal of the Church is a central focus of this Synod. This is a replica of the cross St Francis of Assisi is said to have been praying in front of when he received a divine commission to "rebuild" the church.

3. The **layout of the Synod with the round tables** signifies the very different process that this Synod is adopting. It gave us a powerful image of how Pope Francis' process for the Synod on Synodality is helping shift the feeling that the truth resides at the top of the hierarchy. It was really striking to see Pope Francis addressing the synod not from the stage, where we usually see

him, but from one round table among many. Indeed, Pope Francis offered his opening remarks to the Synod from a roundtable, surrounded by tablets, saying that if you have disagreements with your sister or your bishop, say it to their face, not behind their backs. This model is a very different type of Synod from those in the past where many outcomes were determined before the meeting had even begun!...

The message from the first week of the Synod is then, very clear. The Synod is primarily about transforming the life of the Catholic Church to become more responsive to the Spirit. And as Fr Andrew Hamilton SJ brilliantly points out (see https://catholicoutlook.org/areflection-for-the-popes-prayer-intention-for-october-2023/) — "the effectiveness of the Synod will not lie in the quality of the speeches that are made, the majorities that are won on significant votes, nor in the changes to Church structures that are agreed upon. It will lie in the quality of the interchange between people at every level that is generated by the Synod."

Fr Hamilton sees the potential for Synod as an attractive model for the whole Church in all its relationships at parish, diocesan and national levels ...

I personally believe this Synod is primarily notable because it is showing concretely how a new relationship between lay people and the hierarchical Church and between men and women in the Catholic Church is possible! ...

We need a future Church leadership that is willing to give up power in favour of new structures. The Church is definitely not a democracy. But neither is it a dictatorship – even a benevolent dictatorship!

Therefore, as Pope Francis never tires of repeating: **Our future as a Church is not one of prohibitions and commandments, but a Church that lives in relationship with people and in relationship with Jesus Christ.** That is the bottom line and I believe the Synod will show us the direction the pilgrim people of God must travel.

Music at Our Lady of Mount Carmel Church



REFLECTION

Invitations refused and accepted

The third of the parables addressed to the chief priests and the elders is our Gospel today. Told in the context of a wedding feast given by a great King it's a parable in three parts.

The first part is about God's gracious invitation and its indifferent and sometimes violent refusal by those invited first (the religious and lay leaders).

Second part: God's invitation having been rejected by the first to whom it was offered, is now offered to others - good and bad alike (the sinners).

Third part: the story of the guest without a wedding garment - one who accepts the invitation but does not change - a little like the son in the first parable who said, "Yes", but didn't go to the vineyard.

The wedding garment is a symbol of a converted life full of good deeds.

The sense of the last line of the Gospel: "Many are called but few are chosen", is that all are called to salvation, but it is only had by those who accept the invitation and who change and yield good deeds.

There is no room for complacency.

All three Gospel parables of the last three Sundays are about conversion. Conversion is not just turning away from sin but a radical reorienting of one's life (turning) towards God. Repentance is not so much being sorry for past sins as a total change of direction. Conversion is impossible for the self- righteous because they don't believe they need it. Hardness of heart and the refusal to listen are two great biblical sins.

In the three parables, St Matthew is urging his community to seek after true righteousness which comes from conversion and repentance, which flows from allowing the vision of God to fill their eyes and hearts. The kingdom has been entrusted to them, they are to produce its fruit of good deeds through a life of continual turning towards God.

Hard hearts, blocked ears, blind eyes, refusing to change are the path to death. We are those who choose Life.




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GOSPEL


