THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST YEAR B - 2 june 2024

Dear sisters and brothers,

Today is a day of double celebration. On this Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, not only do we celebrate in a special way the wonderful gift of the Eucharist, but as a local parish community we also celebrate the wonderful news announced by the Carmelite Provincial, Fr Bruce Clark, earlier in the week that our much loved former Pastor, Fr Hugh Brown, has been cleared, by both civil and church authorities, of the allegations which have dogged him since December 2022 and prevented him from engaging in any public ministry. Not only is Fr Hugh much relieved that this horrible episode has now run its course as far as any personal accusations go, but the Carmelite Community shares in this sense of relief - and the joy that accompanies it as do Fr Hugh's many friends and supporters, including parishioners of St Joseph's and Our Lady of Mount Carmel parish. Fr Hugh is now free to settle into the retirement he anticipated from January 2023 but which has been so cruelly overshadowed by the awful allegations made against him. We will be arranging a suitable opportunity, as a parish, to formally acknowledge and thank Fr Hugh for his nine years of dedicated service as Parish Priest of Port Melbourne-Middle Park and to wish him well in his retirement. Along with the Carmelite Community, Fr Hugh is extremely grateful for the personal and prayerful support of parishioners during his "trial" over the past seventeen months and he has penned the following expression of gratitude:

My dear Friends,

The past 17 months have been a personal nightmare, and I acknowledge that it has also caused immense distress for so many others.

Both our Churches are fitted with a hearing induction loop. Please use the 'T' or other appropriate switch on your hearing aid. Please tell us if you experience any difficulty.

To them, I am incredibly sorry for the impact that they have experienced.

When you face something like this, your life is turned upside down, and despite the confusion, depression and anger that I have felt, there is a positive side to it all.

I have rediscovered the joy of gratitude and the immense love and appreciation of so many people.

Carmelites, family, friends, and parishioners have been extraordinarily loving and supportive throughout this journey. I could not have asked for more, and my gratitude for each one is extraordinary.

Every one of you knows who you are and what you have done for me, and I can only offer a simple but heartfelt, thank you.

There is so much suffering in our world, and my pain is an insignificant part of it all.

We must fight for a world where compassion, kindness, truth-telling and loving support replace the venom and hatred displayed on so many fronts.

Please continue to pray for me as I do for you and if I don't see you soon, I'll see you in heaven.

As we celebrate and honour the **Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ** today, the Gospel reading from Mark recalls the Last Supper when Jesus gathered with his disciples to celebrate the great Jewish feast of Passover. This celebration took the form of a ritualized meal that recalled the "passing over" of the Jewish children in the general slaughter of children in Egypt that would result in the Jews been freed from their slavery. This "passover" occurred because the blood of a sacrificed lamb or goat was sprinkled on the doorposts and lintel of Jewish homes as a sign to the slaughtering angel to "pass over" their house. Meanwhile, the family ate the roasted animal (the paschal lamb).

It was in the context of the meal in which Jews celebrated annually their "Passover" – and their freedom from slavery – that Jesus gave new meaning

to this ritual on the night before he died (and foreshadowing his death on the Cross). Jesus gave new significance to the bread and wine of this ritual meal when he shared it among his disciples. Henceforth, whenever the disciples of Jesus gathered and ritually shared bread and wine in memory of him, i.e. celebrated the Eucharist, they would be eating his body and drinking his blood. He was the new paschal lamb who liberated his disciples eternally from the slavery of sin to enjoy the freedom of the sons and daughters of God.

As we celebrate this feast of the Body and Blood of Christ – and each time we celebrate Eucharist, we are united with one another in him and his sacrifice on the Cross and empowered to be his presence in the world today through our love, self-sacrifice and service of others.

As National Reconciliation Week draws to a close tomorrow (Monday), we might continue our prayer:

Lord, open our hearts so that we may hear the message you teach of a world in which a reconciled people walk and talk together sharing stories; a world in which all burn with the desire to have your peace and justice reign. We ask this in Jesus' name.

<u>REFLECTION</u> Body & Blood - The real presence of Jesus in us

Today's feast celebrates the enduring sign of Christ's presence with us in the Bread and Wine of the Eucharist.

The Church always uses celebrations not simply to commemorate something in the past, but as a lens to look at the meaning of the celebration in the present. That is part of the 'incarnational' pattern of the Church – enfleshing the mysteries we celebrate.

Our feast today also celebrates Christ's presence with us in the community of the Church. The Eucharist is our sacrament of communion, not only with Christ and God, but also with all those called into the Christian community. Our communion binds us to one another in a sacred union of mind and heart with Jesus.

The word 'communion' means to share in common. In Holy Communion what we share in common with God and each other is Jesus Christ present in the Bread and the Wine. Another meaning of 'communion' is to be of one mind and heart. It is the Holy Spirit who keeps us in communion of mind and heart with God, with Christ and with each other.

We are very used to talking about the Real Presence of Jesus being in the Blessed Sacrament. But the real presence of Christ is also in the community when it gathers in his name to feast on the Word of Scripture, to recall what Jesus said and did at the Last Supper (not only the words over bread and wine, but also the washing of the feet), when it shares the food of the Eucharist together, when it goes out and continues to break and pour out that food in acts of loving kindness, in soothing and nourishing words which brings others to life.

The Eucharist is not an object to be looked at, but an action to be done so that the living presence of Jesus continues to touch and heal.

Maybe we need to think more deeply about the real presence of Jesus being in real, living human beings. Bread and Wine have no eyes to gaze with love, no face with which to smile, no mouth to speak soothing words, no arms to hold the grieving and the sick, or to lend a hand, no ears to hear the pain. But we do.

We are nourished and fed with the life of Christ so that we may be Christ in the world. Together we become the Body of Christ alive and active in our world. That is what energises us to work to transform the injustices and limitations of the world around us. We transform them with the vision (mind) and love (heart) of God so that every person may live, breathe, eat and drink of all the good things God gives us: nature, knowledge, understanding, technology, food, medicine, compassion, justice, goodness, love, peace, forgiveness, encouragement and hope.

So we become the Eucharist that feeds those around us with the nourishment of respect, love, breadth of heart and vision, compassion, hope and forgiveness which enables them to grow in their likeness of God and live their human lives well.

Half of the blood Moses took up and put into basins, the other half he cast on the altar. And taking the Book of the Covenant he read it to the listening people, and they said, 'We will observe all that the Lord has decreed; we will obey.' SECOND READING

Hebrews 9:11-15

Now Christ has come, as the high priest of all the blessings which were to come. He has passed through the greater, the more perfect tent, which is better than one made by people's hands because it is not of this created order; and he has entered the sanctuary once and for all, taking with him not the blood of goats and bull calves, but his own blood, having won an eternal redemption for us. The blood of goats and bulls and the ashes of a heifer are sprinkled on those who have incurred defilement and they restore the holiness of their outward lives; how much more effectively the blood of Christ, who offered himself as the perfect sacrifice to God through the eternal Spirit, can purify our inner self from dead actions so that we do our service to the living God.

He brings a new covenant, as the mediator, only so that the people who were called to an eternal inheritance may actually receive what was promised: his death took place to cancel the sins that infringed the earlier covenant.

The disciples set out and went to the city and found everything as he had told them, and prepared the Passover.



And as they were eating he took some bread, and when he had said the blessing he broke it and gave it to them. 'Take it,' he said 'this is my body.' Then he took a cup, and when he had returned thanks he gave it to them, and all drank from it, and he said to them, 'This is my blood, the blood of the covenant, which is to be poured out for many. I tell you solemnly, I shall not drink any more wine until the day I drink the new wine in the kingdom of God.'

After psalms had been sung they left for the Mount of Olives.
