TWENTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 20 August 2023

Dear sisters and brothers.

Today's Gospel story acquaints us with the Canaanite woman, famous for outwitting Jesus.

The story is told by Matthew at a time when some of the disciples of the Jewish community to which Matthew was ministering were reaching out to those beyond the boundaries of Israel – the Gentiles – and inviting them to follow the Way of Jesus. This was causing some consternation in the Jewish community because many among them, even most, believed that, as the "Chosen People", the salvation offered by God, in and through Jesus, was exclusively for them.

The story of the (non Jewish) Canaanite woman presents Jesus, in his initial response, forcefully rejecting her plea to take pity on her and rid her daughter of the devil which tormented her. Not to be easily dismissed, this woman turns Jesus' association of Gentiles with dogs back on him in her retort: "even house-dogs can eat the scraps that fall from their master's table". The rest is history!

The story presents Jesus as a human being who grows in his own understanding of his mission. He comes to recognize that he is called to foster faith in God's love and mercy and salvation among all people, not just the traditionally "chosen" Israelites. He recognizes and rewards the "great faith" of the Canaanite woman, a talisman for all Gentiles – like us.

As we hear this story today, we give thanks for the gift of faith with which we are blessed. We recognize our call, as disciples of Jesus, to reach out in love and mercy, welcome, generosity, compassion, understanding, kindness, justice and forgiveness to all, not just those like us – or whom we particularly like. We also recognize that, as humans like Jesus, we are called to be humble enough to admit that we don't always get it right and that, in the course of life, we are challenged to grow into the truth and the fullness of life. If at first you don't succeed ...



A Kingdom for all

Today's Gospel marks a turning point in the ministry of Jesus. He sees himself as sent 'only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel'. That is, to those who were deemed sinners because they could not keep the Law of Moses, and were considered beyond the care and concern of God by religious authorities.

The story centres around a confrontation between Jesus and a pagan (Canaanite) woman. Firstly, Jesus ignores her altogether. Then, because the woman is making such a racket, the disciples ask him to give her what she wants. Jesus refuses. The woman approaches him directly and asks for help. He refuses again, quoting an ancient popular racial slur against the Canaanites. His words are harsh and demeaning, but the woman persists. She defeats Jesus' argument with her quick thinking and by twisting his own imagery in her favour. She points out to him that everyone, not just Israelites, can share in the goodness of God. Jesus opens his eyes to a broader, more inclusive, understanding of his mission. Admiring her sense of faith, Jesus tells the woman that her daughter is healed.

St Matthew uses this story about Jesus and the woman to answer the question about who belongs in the Kingdom of God – who are the insiders and who are the outsiders?

In terms of the story not only Israelites, but all who come with faith, are part of the Kingdom. The first reading from the Prophet Isaiah makes the same point: God's house is a house for all the peoples.

Matthew's early Christian community is struggling with accepting some non-Jews wanting to join them. Just as Jesus (the ultimate insider) moves past his own prejudices, so the members of the Kingdom and the Church must move past theirs' so that God's house of prayer will be a place of justice and integrity for all the peoples; a house from which God's salvation and healing flows.

Then Jesus answered her, 'Woman, you have great faith. Let your wish be granted.' And from that moment her daughter was well again.



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Food Cupboard Update THANK-YOU

Our volunteers would like to thank parishioners and locals who have contributed to the food cupboard. Those in need are very grateful for your generosity. Some 'regulars' are coming each week and have started interacting with the volunteers and each other.

Some lessons that have been learnt are:

- Recipients are grateful for the clean, warm environment and opportunity to interact with volunteers and each other over a cuppa or read the paper.
- They are grateful for **small jars and cans** as often storage of larger quantities can impact the space available in their small accommodation.
- Many recipients are living on their own and can't consume the large quantities of some items whilst it is fresh, therefore they prefer the small sized jars and cans especially for coffee, tea, peanut butter, etc.
- The cupboard's needs change from week to week. At the moment, we have an adequate supplys of: soup, pasta, corn kernels, tinned salmon, baked beans and spaghetti.
- Donations needed include & gratefully appreciated are:
 - small jars of coffee
 - small boxes of black tea bags
 - dry biscuits
 - sweet biscuits
 - small cans of tuna
 - small jar of honey
 - small jar of jam
 - cans of tinned fruit
 - small boxes of fruit juice
 - toilet rolls

Just as Michelangelo's Creation of Adam (detail below) is considered the most famous fresco of the Sixtine Chapei, so Allegri's Miserere, created some hundred and twenty years later, is perhaps that chapel's most famous musical composition. Much as Michelangelo's multi-paneled ceiling fresco is framed by the works of earlier masters on the walls below - Botticelli, Chirlandaio and Perugino - so, in the ACC's Sistine Chapel program, Allegri's masterpiece is supported by the works of his antecedents in the Sistine Chapel Choir - Josquin, Arcadelt, and Palestrina.

SISTINE CHAPEL

Michelangelo wrote a sonnet describing the physical pain he endured during the five years he spent singlehandedly painting the Sistine Chapel ceiling, his head titted back while standing stop a scaffold. Two of his many poems are sung as part of the ACC's Sistine Chapel program, set to music by, Arcadelt, who was director of the Choir from 1539 to '51. These madrigals demonstrate the innovative genius that made the new madrigal genre and Arcadelt's name known throughout Europe.

Giovanni Pieriuigi da Patestrina was appointed to the Sistine Chapel Choir in January 1555, only to get the each six months later. When Paul IV ascended to the papacy, married men were immediately banned from the choir and Palestrina, who was married with four children, was dismissed. A current member of the Sistine Chapel Choir, English bass, Mark Spyropoulos said "When you are a singer looking for work, you invariably spend a lot of time being in the wrong place at the right time and the right place at the wrong time". This was the case with Palestrina, who was not invited back for sixteen years.

Oregorio Allegri was a countertenor in the Sistine Chapel choir 8629-7521. His Miserere had been a Vatican favourite for at least a century when the fourteen-year-old Mozart heard it during an Easter visit in 1770. The story goes that the young Mozart wrote the piece out in its entirety from memory, thus contravening the Papal edict that copies of the music must not leave the Vatican. And it still gets top billing today. The Miserere was voted "most loved unaccompanied choral work" by the ACC's audience in 2022. Following the ACC's performance of the Miserere, the program concludes with a relatively unknown work. Christus resurgens is a Duoyant and lively piece that proves that Alliegri was much more than just a 'one hit wonder'.

The ACC's online program notes are full of fabulous paintings and the stories behind them. With a little imagination, you'll feel as if you really did just visit the Vatican. The Dunkeld performance is offered in conjunction with a choice of dining and accommodation packages at the award-winning Royal Mail Hotel.
