Fourth Sunday of Easter - 21 April 2024

Dear sisters and brothers,

In todays' Gospel Reading, we hear Jesus describe himself as the "Good Shepherd", the one who lays down his life for his sheep. He goes on to say: "I know my own and my own know me ... and I lay down my life for my sheep". He then adds: "And there are other sheep I have that are not of this fold, and these I have to lead as well". Jesus is saying that he is for everyone, those who identify as his followers, but everyone else as well. If we are true to our call to follow Jesus, then we, like him, need to reach out in love to others, irrespective of who they are or what they do or don't believe. By implication, we are called to resist, like Jesus, those forces which seek to divide rather than unite people and establish hierarchies among people rather than acknowledge that we are all equal as daughters and sons of God and sisters and brothers of each other.

Recently I received a request from a regular parishioner to inform us of an Event being organised by a group of Australian Christian people who stand firmly against Antisemitism – hatred of Jewish people. I think the Gospel impels us to do this, along with all forms of racism, sexism and discrimination. The Event is organised by NAIN (Never Again Is Now) and it will take place on 19 May in Melbourne CBD from 1:30 to 4:00pm.

The Event does NOT promote any political Agenda in the context of the current war in the Holy Land. On examining NAIN's website, www.neveragainisnow.com.au, I found the following statement: We know that the history and politics of the Middle East is complicated and contested. However, we firmly believe that there is never an excuse for antisemitism ...We believe that decent, peace loving Australians oppose antisemitism, and want a safe, inclusive, and cohesive society for all. We look forward to working with anyone of any religious, or non-religious, background who wishes to join us in this stand.

In light of the Gospel, therefore, and not in any sense wanting to promote a political Agenda, I am happy to draw this Event to your attention for your consideration. I see it as part of a broader stand against racism towards anyone. I recommend you consult NAIN's website for further information.

CARMELITE ASSEMBLY

The Carmelite Provincial Assembly is taking place next week. This meeting occurs every three years as a time for prayer, discussion, discernment and community in the life of the Carmelite Family of Australia and Timor Leste.

Along with all Carmelite ministries, our parish will be represented to participate in friendly dialogue and will be invited to share the experience of life in the Carmelite Family. This listening to diverse and creative work being undertaken in the Province will help the Carmelites be mindful of the movement of the Spirit in discerning possibilities and priorities for the future.

The delegates have also been asked to bring a symbol to remind all present of the places and people with whom we live and minister. This symbol will form part of our Assembly opening prayer.

The Parish Leadership Group recently reflected on what this symbol should be and decided to present 2 symbols:

- 1. The Message Stick present at liturgies each week to represent the diversity and welcome our community offers. This Aboriginal symbol enriches the liturgy by linking the Gospel message to this land – Australia. And to remind us that the message of love, hope, forgiveness and peace in the Gospel needs to be handed on.
- 2. A card with an image of Mary sketched by Sally Diserio. Mary as our model and sister in faith, reminds us of the value of women in our Carmelite family and a feeling of being at home and embraced just as we are.

SYNODALITY

Launched by Pope Francis at Pentecost 2021 the Synod on Synodality has been termed the largest consultation process in human history. In order to determine the way forward in the 3rd millennium, submissions are being gathered from dioceses from every continent around the world and will be fed into the Synod meeting in Rome in October this year.

At the meeting of our Parish Leadership & Exploration Group last Tuesday night, we began the process of understanding what Synodality means for us, our Church and our Parish.

The literal meaning of Synodality is "Journeying Together" and the outcomes that Pope Francis hopes it will achieve are 'communion, participation and mission'.

Around the table, the group contributed and discussed various points we felt might be encompassed in this 'path forward'. Among them are:

Listening and becoming aware Having a Voice Speaking our Truth Accepting Change Forming Connections Room for all People Welcoming Conversation and Discernment Prayer Calling on the gifts of Baptism

In the coming months we hope to share with the Parish our understanding of these points and to offer the opportunity for wider education and for receiving your feedback. In the meantime, we encourage you to think about what the future of our Church might look like and to engage in conversation with members of this group or the people around you.

SYNOD SYMBOL



A large, majestic tree, full of wisdom and light, reaches for the sky. A sign of deep vitality and hope which expresses the cross of Christ. It carries the Eucharist, which shines like the sun. The horizontal branches, opened like hands or wings, suggest, at the same time, the Holy Spirit.

The people of God are not static: they are on the move, in direct reference to the etymology of the word synod, which means "journeying together". The people are united by the same common dynamic that this Tree of Life breathes into them, from which they begin their walk.

These 15 silhouettes sum up our entire humanity in its diversity of life situations of generations and origins. This aspect is reinforced by the multiplicity of bright colours which are themselves signs of joy. There is no hierarchy between these people who are all on the same footing: young, old, men, women, teenagers, children, lay people, religious, parents, couples, singles; the bishop and the nun are not in front of them, but among them. Quite naturally, children and then adolescents open their walk, in reference to these words of Jesus in the Gospel: "I praise you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because you have hidden these things from the wise and learned and revealed them to little children". (Mt 11:25)

The horizontal baseline: "For a synodal Church: communion, participation and mission" runs from left to right in the direction of this march, underlining and strengthening it, to end with the title "Synod 2021 - 2024", the high point that synthesizes the whole.

REFLECTION

Jesus, true Shepherd

The Fourth Sunday of Easter is often called "Good Shepherd Sunday" because no matter what reading cycle we are in, the Gospel always focusses on the image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd.

This year, the Gospel reading talks about Jesus as a true shepherd prepared to lay down his life for his sheep. He is not like the hired man who runs away when danger appears. He knows his sheep and one day will gather them all into one flock.

Jesus acts towards us like a good shepherd: feeding, nurturing, defending and even laying down his life for us. Our Good Shepherd is deeply concerned about us, the flock and there is a deep sense of warmth and intimacy in the realisation that Jesus knows each one of us by name. Like a good shepherd Jesus is the source of life, nourishment, and safety for the sheep.

Any reflection about Jesus as the Good Shepherd also serves as a reminder that shepherding each other in Jesus' name is part of the vocation of every disciple. We are very used to thinking about Jesus as the Good Shepherd, but we also need to think about being/becoming good shepherds to each other.

One of the very encouraging things about the pandemic was the number of people who became good shepherds to others, providing safety and security to vulnerable people, supporting health workers, providing meals and companionship.

That is what it means to lay down our lives for each other.


John 10.11-18
